

REPEAT

If secular Franciscans put their Franciscan lives in second or third or fourth place in their lives, our Franciscan Order is in jeopardy. We cannot continue with half-hearted commitments. Profession in the SFO requires that the SFO is the primary choice in the lives of Secular Franciscans. Though there may be times when this does not apply - it remains a primary commitment.

COMMENT: Franciscans choose SFO commitments in preference to other commitments. We are NOT just another parish organization nor a once-a-month commitment. Profession calls us to service of the SFO, the Church and the world for each day of our lives. The SFO Rule points out ways in which we serve the Church and the world.

Total commitment is what we are about. Indifference, ignorance of the Rule and Constitutions, laziness, or easy excuses are NOT acceptable reasons for a lack of faithfulness to the SFO way of life embraced at profession.

Of course there are times when attending gatherings will be difficult or impossible. Absence then makes sense. No one expects the impossible. But Franciscans are to bring Francis' spirit to the Church and the world. We continually deepen our commitment. We bring our gifts, ideas, time, financial resources, and prayerfulness to contribute to fraternity life. Recognizing the call to conversion (Rule #7) makes it obvious that we readily offer one another the help, support and sharing that will keep us faithful to our profession.

Every secular Franciscan, even those who are legitmately excused from gatherings, contribute what they can to fraternity life. Shut-ins, those with chronic illness, those living in nursing homes and others may be unable to attend gatherings. As they are able, the SFO depends on their prayer, their interest, their readiness to respond and their contributions both personal and financial.

Local councils take special care of excused members. Local councils take special care of newly professed members. The fraternity has the duty to give special attention to the formation of the newly professed ... to help them become fully mature in their vocation and develop a true sense of belonging. (Constitutions - Article 44.2) Local councils make special efforts to create informative, helpful and prayerful regular gatherings.

All SFO members are expected to become familiar with the SFO Constitutions and our National statutes. Frequently one or the other has answers to problems that may arise. Service to the fraternity is helped by knowing these basic Franciscan documents.

IN ADDITION!

To be a Secular Franciscan in the spirit of the Rule of 1978 requires us to delete some of the things we followed and practiced before 1978. We are human and tend to stick with what we know. New directions, fresh ideas, different practices are not easily embraced. All of us need to recognize the personal ideas, practices and perceptions that fit the Rule of 1978 and those that do not.

Each of us has a personal responsibility to change whatever hinders living the 1978 Rule. We don't keep things because we always did it this way! We delete hindrances in order to create room for what the Holy Spirit gives us in the Rule of 1978. It doesn't take a genius to know that change is not something sudden and wonderful. It takes time, work, prayer, study, experience, dialogue and a good dose of humility to embrace the newness being given us by the Holy Spirit.

I rejoice that you continue to enrich your ways of Franciscan living. I rely on your prayerfulness and offer you mine in return. Together we are called to bring a Franciscan flavor to the Church and the world. To do so we help one another to understand what we have professed and find practical ways to show it. Our integrity and faithfulness are God-given. We are never alone but challenged by the Spirit to deeper faithfulness.

With this in mind we pray for you always, that our God may count you worthy of your calling, and that his power may bring to fulfillment every good purpose and every act inspired by faith, so that the name of our Lord Jesus may be glorified in you, and you in him, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Q. Judy, Where were you born?

A. Rochester, Michigan, where I lived until I went to college.

O. Where were you educated?

A. I received my B.S. from Michigan State
University, earning the Trustees'
Award for second highest GPA in my
graduating class, then went on to
obtain a Master of Science degree at the
University of Wisconsin-Madison.
I'm a professional researcher and specialize in
experimental design and
statistical analysis for scientific studies.
I have conducted studies for and provided
research and expertise to major universities,
non-profit organizations, and Fortune 500
companies for over twenty-five years.

Q. How long have you lived in the Fox Valley?

A. Twenty-two years.

Q. How did you become disabled?

A. I became disabled after a number of exposures to commonly used toxic chemicals, primarily pesticides.

Q. How did you become interested in ecology?

A. I've always been fascinated by the intricacy and beauty of creation, from quarks to quacking ducks!

O. How did you and Michael meet?

A. Ah, now that's a tale! I met Michael when he came to visit his cousin (my college roommate), and he couldn't get in to see her, as the doorbell was broken and the building had a security lock.

So he climbed two stories up the face of the building and knocked on our patio door so he could visit anyways! My roommate assured me that we didn't need to call the police, that the

crazy athlete on our balcony really was her first cousin, and let him in

Michael and I went out on our first date the very next day.

Q. How long have you two been married? **A. Twenty-seven years.**

Q. What is your background in computers?

A. My minors on my master's degree are statistics and computer science. At the time I became disabled, I was the Director of AAL's strategic information systems (computer) planning unit within their data processing division. So I've been working with computer systems, big and small, since the 1970s, when a disk drive was the size of a washing machine! Nowadays, I use special braces on my hands and voice activated software to run my computer.

Q. What are your goals for the future?

A. I want to help shape a future where all of us, especially children, are safe from exposures to toxic chemicals. I currently devote my energy and expertise to this as my health permits.

And - I'd love to get my just-finished novel published, once I figure out how to get a good agent who will take on an author who can't travel or attend book signings!

Q. How did you get involved in the SFO?

"...Now and at the Hour of Our Death" - A Franciscan Perspective

St. Paschal Baylon fraternity presented a five-part production which explored the sacred moments in Francis and Clare's life and re-examined their perception for fraternal and personal end of life decisions. The sessions blended in with St. Paschal Baylon's annual retreat held at the Dominican Sisters Siena Center in Racine, WI, from September 28 –



30. Secular Franciscans from the S.E. Wisconsin district attended this retreat.

"Secular Franciscans should create in their fraternities a climate of faith and hope so that "Sister Death" may be regarded as a passage to the Father, and all may prepare...with serenity."

SFO Constitution, Article 27

As we have struggled to identify the 'right' way to die, the reality is that there is no right way, said Karen Nehls, SFO. Karen's opening presentation talked about the spiritual concerns related to

end of life issues, such as fear, reconciliation, the welfare of those left behind, and integrity issues. Karen said that each person has their own path and our role is to companion them. We can companion best when we listen and ask the 'right' questions.

FIVE TASKS OF THE DYING

For family/ friends. Karen talked about the five important concerns to think about when someone you know is about to die: 1) Be able to say, "I am sorry if I hurt you in any way." 2) Be able to say, "I forgive..." 3) To be able to say, "I thank you for all that you have done for me and what your have taught me." 4) Share the feelings in your heart: "I love you" "you are a treasure" I will miss you." 5) To be able to say "Good bye" "I will be OK because you have taught me well."

Each session throughout the retreat provided guiding steps in legal preparations such power of attorney (*POA*), end of life issues (*do not resuscitate order*); physical and spiritual suffering. How do we face death in our family and ourselves? How do we suddenly discern emergency or modern medical technology, ethics, and funeral arrangements, blended with Franciscan thought?

Jim Carlson spoke on the importance of drawing up an estate will and disability planning. JoAnn Boss continued with discussion on a patients' planning a POA healthcare document and how to honor their final wishes.

REFLECTIONS ON PAIN AND SUFFERING

Fr. Linus Kopczewski, OFM spoke about the journey of the sacred. In the beginning of our lives, "God's breath is breathed into us, and when we die, that breath returns back to God." He added that suffering can build character but it can also paralyze the human spirit. "We can learn about our mortality," Fr. Linus said, "through suffering and that makes us more dependent on God. The bible say that God feels pain though our rejection of His love for us."

"The book of Romans speaks about the groaning of creation of all living things waiting to be liberated. And this text says that one of God's purposes of the world is for us to live with this kind of reality: we don't know about our future. That's the way God's wants us to live because there are so many

individual things that have to fall into place. So, we live in faith."

After the main talks were presented to the group on Saturday afternoon, small break out stations were set-up in a room where Secular Franciscans stopped and ask questions or discussed their end of life concerns. The individual stations occupied by Secular Franciscans who work professionally in respective legal, hospital or spiritual fields were meant to counsel with members having further questions.

The retreat evaluation reports stated that this type of workshop proved very useful in end of life decision making and funeral arrangements. One Franciscan said that the "Now and at the Hour of Our Death" should be presented to Secular Franciscans in the LaVerna Region at the 2008 Chapter gathering.

Even though the topic may seem a little depressing, death is inescapable and our SFO Rule (19) states we are "*immersed in the resurrection of Christ, which gives true meaning to Sister Death [and] the ultimate encounter with the Father.*" Editor's note: additional presentation support and credit: Bob Witek, SFO, and Deacon Pat Frye.

Book Review <u>The Disciple and The</u> Master,

translated by Fr. Eric Doyle, OFM



This is a fine study of Francis and his philosophy by St. Bonaventure through a presentation of sermons, which are luckily preserved for our edification. Bonaventure neatly explains St. Francis through major sermons. The first sermon centers on the Mendicant controversy. Bonaventure

defends Francis as a model of gospel holiness, and establishes the reality of the stigmata against an obvious and open attack. Sermon two opens with the assertion that the Francis' stigmata was God's gift. In the third sermon Bonaventure compares St Francis to Zerubbable an Old Testament figure who leads his people from Babylon and rebuilt the Temple...Francis led people out of the captivity of sin to Christ, and founded a religious order for God's honor.

In the introduction to sermon four, Bonaventure reflects on the qualities of fidelity and wisdom required in the preacher of God's word. Bonaventure then expounds the root of St. Francis' holiness, its' loftiness, its' considerable virtues. Sermon five explains why the word of God must be preached often, and

about St. Francis' humility, lowliness, and purity of heart. The final sermon, by Cardinal Odo of Chateauroux, develops a theological continued on next page reflection of St. Francis in the light of Trinitarian theology and in the light of selected areas of Christology. This is a fascinating book and required several readings, but I learned quite a bit and enjoyed it immensely. I'm certain that I will read it again...probably several times.

FORMATION THOUGHTS

TOO BUSY

Article 7 of our Rule states: "Let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel call conversion." In our day and age, it seems that everyone is so "busy."

We hear this as an excuse for lack of attendance and/ or participation at the monthly meeting, days of reflection, retreats, apostolate, socials. etc.

I wonder if it isn't time to re-evaluate our priorities. In his book *Journey to Daybreak*, Henri Nouwen writes about the year he left the academic world of Harvard University to live and work with the L'Arch Community: community living with the developmentally disabled. He felt he had to get away from the "busyness" of the university

setting. He wrote in his book that we need to be able to attend to the "important" and be willing to delay the "urgent" or let go completely. However, even at L'Arch he was soon "busy."

A Jesuit friend told Henri that was his character defect. The place was not the key to his busyness. Henri Nouwen created the same usyness at L'Arch that he experienced at Harvard.

Maybe it's time to re-evaluate our lives and determine what's "important" and what "urgent" things can be put off or let undone, and birth that radical interior change in which we are called.
