

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

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Ministers View:

Greetings Sisters and Brothers,

In the shadows of our recent Chapter I am filled with joy to know what a success the gathering was. By the results of the evaluations from those who attended all were pleased with the workshops. We are very pleased with your participation and positive results. Thank you all for attending. For those who did not make it this year —we hope to see you next year, please plan ahead.

In our Rule/Constitution, Article 21, we read:

1. Rule 16 For Francis, work is a gift and to work is a grace. Daily work is not only the means of livelihood, but the opportunity to serve God and neighbor as well as a way to develop one's personality. conviction that work is a right and a duty and that every form of occupation deserves respect, the brothers and sisters should commit themselves to collaborate so that all persons may have the possibility to work and so that working conditions may always be more humane

In my view I see this gift of work applying to our working as members of our fraternity councils. We are called to serve each other as well as the community we live in.

This fall many of our local fraternities are to hold elections for their council. So many of us have served on council through the years, that it has become a revolving door for some of us.

I ask each of you to take a look at yourself and ask, "is it my turn to serve my fraternal family?"

We also read in Article 30:

- The brothers and sisters are co-responsible for the life of the fraternity to which they belong and for the SFO as the organic union of all fraternities throughout the world.
- The sense of co-responsibility
 of the members requires
 personal presence, witness,
 prayer, and active collaboration,
 in accordance with each one's
 situation and possible obligations
 for the animation of the
 fraternity.

Hear again is a message that calls us to be in service to each other. What is your response to this call? Where do you fit into the call to step up and serve as an active member of the council?

Each of us has a talent to give to the full fraternal family, is it your turn to give of your self?

So many times we tell ourselves, I am not smart enough, I don't have the ability to do well -- I just don't have the time. Is this your response?

Know that the Holy Spirit is with you and will not abandon you when you are in need. Place yourself in his loving hands and be willing to do your part and offer to be placed on the ballot for elections. Don't wait to be asked, come forward to say, "If I am needed, I will serve".

Know that the Regional Council is here to offer assistance to you as fraternal council. If you have questions related to how things should be done, we are here to help you. We will always stand by and offer any help you may need.

We are in prayer with and for each of our local fraternities as the election process is carried out.

Regional Spiritual Assistant Lester Bach OFM Cap

At this point in time, the 1978 SFO Rule ought to be making an impact on Secular Franciscans. In turn, they then impact that part of the world where they live. The SFO Rule offers specific ideas about peace and justice. We need to know what they are and make them seen and heard. The SFO Rule has a focus about family life and marriage. We ought to be encouraging families in ways that support their efforts in living a Christcentered life together. The SFO Rule calls us to relate to one another in ways that will build a "communion" among us. Any words, actions or attitudes that keep us separate from family, fraternity, neighbors and the world community should be deleted from our lives. We are Franciscans with a particular perspective on life and living.

We view life, the world, and its people from a Franciscan perspective. We look for ways to bring people together rather than condemning them and bringing separation among us. Forgiveness is our way of dealing with the hurts others may bring into our lives. We will not be dominated by anger and hatred, bitterness and revenge. It is not in our Franciscan bones to act that way! Seeking forgiveness is our way of dealing with those we have hurt. We cannot "make them" forgive us, but our spirit seeks them out to try to receive forgiveness. We too easily fall into the trap of "labeling" enemies so we can do whatever we want to them. The label helps keep them from being the neighbor whom Jesus calls us to love.

We franciscans have a spirit of stewardship. We are not deceived into thinking that happiness is found by the accumulation of things and bank accounts. We need basic things for life. But we recognize that we often have what others may need for even a minimum human life. As stewards we find ways of sharing with others rather than merely accumulating things for ourselves.

Franciscans recognize that we have not always been creative about our monthly

gatherings. We may have done little or nothing to learn or to develop actions that help others deal with the issues life brings.

To fill the monthly gathering with devotions and nothing more misses the goal of the monthly gathering. Helping one another live the SFO Rule requires conversations among us as to how we might implement the SFO Rule in today's world and in our daily lives. If our prayer is healthy, it will move us to a deeper compassion and concern for our neighbor and our world. It will move us to DO SOMETHING about the issues we face in secular life. Otherwise the gatherings miss a vital element of Secular Franciscan life.

For any Secular Franciscans who have had little experience of formation with the 1978 SFO Rule and its implications, I would encourage you to invest time and energy in gathering for formation and understanding the implications of the Rule.

This is not a request but a necessity if all of us are to be knowledgeable and dedicated Franciscans. Formation always includes the actions that give life to the Rule. Secular Franciscans have professed to follow the 1978 Rule. To do less is to fail the call given by the Holy Spirit. Ours is not just another organization or society. The Secular Franciscan way of life is meant to touch each moment of each day. There is no time when we are not Franciscans. It is important that we are faithful to whatever our way of life requires.

Such ideas make it obvious why the commitment to your fraternity requires your presence at regular gatherings. Creative ongoing formation programs are useless if you are absent. If there is a solid reason for absence, please talk it over with your fraternity council. They need to know where you stand and what issues influence the decision to attend gatherings or make it impossible for you to be present. Gentle dialogue does wonders!

How wonderful it is that nobody need wait a single moment before starting to improve the world.

Apostolic Commissions on a County Highway Joanne Guzik SFO

In early 1994, the St. John Neumann Fraternity based in Rhinelander, Wisconsin found itself struggling with some of the same issues it had faced for the past few years. Although these weren't very serious, they did seem to be minor obstacles to further growth of the fraternity.

Our recruiting efforts weren't yielding many new candidates. Toward the end of our monthly gathering, we often had difficulty as a group in trying to identify ways we could apply the various Franciscan lessons to our daily lives. We didn't have much trouble meeting the goals of our apostolates because, frankly, we weren't committing ourselves to any significant challenges. We always met our goals of providing approximately the same amount of money to the same worthwhile missions. project in which most members participated was individually saving aluminum cans for what had been, up to that time, optional recycling. The cans were then gathered, sold for the going rate on aluminum and the proceeds were donated to one of the charities we helped to support. However, the rate for aluminum was quickly dropping because recycling was becoming mandated.

Under the sound leadership of our Council, our on-going formation was taking us to a study of the 1990 revisions of the General Constitution based on the revised Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order published in 1978. We started to study the Apostolic Commissions and tried to decide on an apostolate that would give our fraternity an opportunity to take our Franciscan way of life into "the midst of the world". We weren't quite yet sure which of the commissions should be our focus. What might be a new project that would help our fraternity to address some of the minor, yet present, roadblocks that hindered our growth? And, what could we undertake to begin to have fraternity activity toward one of the commissions? The Holy Spirit so reliably responded to our prayers for quidance in the matter.

About that same time, many Wisconsin communities began to promote various versions of their own "Adopt-a-Highway" programs. When the suggestion was first made to the members, there was an element of doubt in the group. Were our middle-aged and older members physically able to pick up trash along local rural highways? Was it safe from a traffic perspective? How about the germ factor? Information provided in a brief video orientation obtained from the County Highway Department answered those concerns in a realistic, positive manner.

OK. We'd give it a try for one year. Our Fraternity Minister, then Marge Huser, signed the necessary application to commit our group to doing this for at least the April through October clean-up season of 1994. Then the dilemma unfolded. Would this project be considered a work commission apostolate or would it more appropriately be an ecology apostolate. Along with the fluorescent orange safety vests the highway department provided, there also would be a sign erected on the highway with the name of our fraternity in big bold letters. It would inform those who used the highway that the St. John Neumann Secular Franciscan

Fraternity was keeping this two mile stretch of County Highway G free of accumulated litter.

In April 1994, armed with our work gloves, work boots, insect repellant and other "tools of the trade", we did our first clean-up event. We soon learned that the spring clean-up is the most difficult because six months' worth of litter has accumulated over winter. In North Central Wisconsin, the grass isn't very tall in April so Mother Nature hasn't had the opportunity to hide any litter. It's all out there for Franciscans to see. So see it we did, and pick it up we did.

The first fruits of our efforts were soon reaped shortly thereafter. A married couple who often drove on that highway to do their errands saw the new Secular Franciscan sign. They had been wondering if there was a Secular Franciscan group in the area. They then were led to contact us. After attending a few monthly gatherings as guests, then helping with the other highway clean-up events that summer, they began formation classes. Both were initial professed a few years later and were active here until they needed to relocate to another part of Wisconsin where they soon became active in the local fraternity near their new home.

In our thirteenth year of cleaning our stretch of Oneida County Highway G, we still aren't sure if this is more of a work commission activity or an ecology one. The colorful sign with the name of our fraternity still looks good. Our orange safety vests are still bright orange. Both of those factors keep our quiet presence out there "in the midst" of this world. Whenever one of us thinks our members are getting too old to physically handle the project, or it's too hard to find a time when a majority of busy members can be out there, the problem of that day is resolved and we do it for a few more years. We have also enjoyed a very good side effect. Doing physical work together and together. laughing occasionally even enjoying a simple meal

together after the work is done has helped us to strengthen the sense of family with our fellow fraternity members.

Although it is very simple work that doesn't require great skill, it meets the description of work found in our important Franciscan tools, our Rule and our Constitution. It fits into at least two of our apostolic commissions. In a secular manner, it promotes awareness of our fraternity as a positive and active presence in the community. It reflects the truth in Article 16 of our Rule: "Let them esteem work both as a gift and a sharing in the creation, redemption and service of the human community."

The best part of this apostolate for me is that when I bend down to pick up discarded fast food wrappers or empty beer cans, I can hear Francis telling his followers that he worked with his own hands and with all his heart he wants his brothers to devote themselves to useful work that would benefit others. I remember that St. Clare told her Sisters that those to whom the Lord has given the grace of working should labor faithfully and devoutly in honesty and for the common good. Most of all, why I value this simple even dirty work is that I can see the beautiful face of Jesus as I clumsily bend over to pick up litter: "The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve."



Ongoing Formation Phase

When we look at the Secular Franciscan formation process, it is important to see it as a continuum, that is, each stage flowing into the next. Aspects that are essential in the first phase, Orientation, will still be essential in the second, Inquiry, the third, Candidacy, and into the Ongoing Formation of professed members.

The purpose of the Ongoing Formation Phase is to support the professed members' commitment, and to strengthen their Franciscan vocation so that the ongoing conversion process will continue as a lifestyle.

"Begun by the preceding stages, the formation of the brothers and sisters takes place in a permanent and continuous way. It should be understood as an aid in the conversion of each and everyone and in the fulfillment of their proper mission in the Church and in society" (General Constitutions, article 44.1).

Ongoing Formation is a process of renewal for the entire Fraternity by which we are encouraged and challenged to live our vocation in the actual situations and contingencies of daily living.

Ongoing Formation is the outgrowth of proper Initial Formation, realizing that we are in a continual process of conversion and growth all the days of our life.


Ongoing Formation necessarily includes additional information and updating in various areas of spirituality,

and deepening of our commitment to the Gospel life. None of us ever completes formation; it is a lifelong process.

Monthly Fraternity gatherings are the ordinary place for Ongoing Formation.


Other opportunities for Ongoing Formation include:

"Recruiting" Members Jim Carlson, SFO

Chapter workshops emphasized that recruiting members is really helping people discern their vocation, what gifts they have and how God is calling them to use them. Lisa Gilson, Our Lady of the Universe fraternity started the workshops off by reading Mt 5:13-16, the Good News that we must share our faith and works with world. Recruiting can be thought of as extension of Formation and Leadership, the other workshop topics. (See Rule 7, 14 & 22 and Constitution Article 45.) Recruiting in with this year's theme. Transformation, as it requires not only transformation of individuals and fraternities, but the world environments that fraternity members impact [cf, Article The Local Fraternity...the privileged place, TAU-USA, Summer 2006 @ p.17].

As a foundation for recruiting, fraternities should exercise good public relations. (See www.nafra-sfo.org/meetings and resources.html for a helpful manual.) Promotional materials can be created or purchased. (See www.franciscanresources.com for a variety of brochures for purchase.)

Three recruitment models were explained. Carol Derozier explained how Sacred Heart fraternity, Oshkosh, was aging and shrinking in size and how she and her husband Don were recruited directly. St. Joseph fraternity, Appleton, helped with a formation team, deferring profession for about two years until they were certain it was God's call. The Derozier's have now themselves recruited several new and younger family members. Carol Gilson, Our Lady of the Universe fraternity. Woodruff explained how her fraternity

annually hosts a food drive for the local food pantry. After the event volunteers are invited to a "thank-you" tea which has been used to also successfully recruit several new members. Young people are often called to "hands on projects" like this and should be viewed as a tool for recruiting younger members LaVerna Vision, Spring 2006 @ p. 91. Jim Behan transferred from a Chicago fraternity to the Madison Rainbow cell of St Paschal Baylon fraternity, Wind Lake. Jim explained the Open House "talks" method-- a detailed process to not only invite the public to learn about the SFO, but also to get members involved in the process. Jim emphasized that we should not be focusing on the negative ("What can a shrinking, aging fraternity do to recruit members?"), but the positive (Let us prepare a good program to explain SFO to those whom God is calling).

Small groups discussed, "What has worked? What hasn't worked?" Discussion groups reported several interesting suggestions including whether or not we should have a Vocations Director on the Regional Council. Smaller. less-resourced fraternities may benefit by coordinating with other fraternities, or even through region-wide coordination to help hold a SFO Open House. Timed, coordinated efforts can also help share costs and enable us to take advantage of largescale announcements, such as Relevant Radio.

SECULAR FRANCISCAN ORDER/SFO 50TH ANNIVERSARY PARTY

The Marquette Fraternity of the Third Order of St. Francis, now called Secular Franciscan Order/SFO, celebrated its 50th Anniversary on June 13th at the Presque Isle Pavilion with a turkey dinner & cake, a salute to its charter members and a visitation by Bishop Alexander Sample. Also as their guest, they had Minister, Betty Rogers and Vice Minister, Jean Thill from St. Francis Fraternity in Escanaba, MI. The celebration was attended by 41 people.

Mary Jane Henning, who serves as minister, recognized some notable fraternity members:

- Charter members Charles and Frances (Mickey) Downs; Charlie was the fraternity's first minister.
- Dennis and Marie Bernier, members for 44 years.
- Fr. Tom Schmied, OFM Cap., the Spiritual Assistant since 1990.

Regional Vice-Minister Lee Ann Niebuhr congratulated the membership on their enthusiasm and good works. Regional Spiritual Assistant, Fr. Lester Bach, OFM Cap., reminded every one of a guiding principle: "You may not be around to finish the job, but you can certainly get started!"

Bob Henning outlined the history of the fraternity. On June 13, 1956, St. Anthony of Padua Fraternity was canonically established. The first location of meetings took place at St. Mary's Hospital with Fr. Constance, OFM Cap. being their first spiritual advisor. His parents, Harry and Dena Constance were the first to be professed. Over the years they have had different spiritual advisors, one of them being Fr. David Harris when he was pastor at St. Louis the King Parish in Harvey, MI. Now they meet at the hall at St. Christopher's Church on the first Wednesday of the month, except for July

and August when they meet the 2nd Wednesday.

St. Francis of Assisi, renowned as a "conqueror of souls," was so successful with stirring feelings of piety that an entire congregation begged to be admitted to his order. In order to accommodate such a request, St. Francis established three different orders. First order was called Friars Minor for the male, single, religious; the second order was called Poor Clare's for the female, single, religious which followed Saint Clare of Assisi; and the third order was for secular male and female, both single or married, now called the Secular Franciscan Order (SFO).

Their lifetime commitment of being a Secular Franciscan has been a means to serving in the different ministries of their parishes. Their group of 39 active members covers 9 different parishes since St. Ann's Fraternity at Chassell, MI merged with them in 2004. The apostolates that the fraternity supports are, Marquette Pregnancy Services (now called Care Clinic), a family in India, Covenant House in New York, and the Marquette Diocese Outreach Program that Sr. Ludmilla coordinates.

Bishop Sample gave the dinner invocation and Fr. Schmied gave the final blessing.


