St. Francis of Assisi Fraternity Celebrates its 100th Anniversary



In 1922, Fr. Betrand Labinski, OFM became pastor of St. Joseph Catholic church in Escanaba, Michigan, and he immediately saw the need of the parishioners. He asked his St. John the Baptist Province's home office in Cincinnati, Ohio that he would like to start a tertiary – a lay association with the organization of the Franciscans.

Soon after, enrollment took place with each member given a scapular and cord.

The following year St. Francis Fraternity, located in Escanaba, received its official charter on April 15, 1923, and the Secular Franciscan fraternity members continue to this day to gather in St. Joseph church.



Thus, a fraternity was born, and as time went on, the group easily grew to about 308 members. All faithfully following the Rule. At that time, there were no expenses, dues, fees, or any other requirement except to be a Catholic in good standing and over 14-years of age.

In 1952 a regional conference was held at St. Joseph's church. Through the years, notes on membership listings dating from 1963 through 1983 showed the many fraternity commissions which members held. The fraternity was very active. Eventually, St. Francis of Assisi fraternity came under the La Verna Region in the 1990s.

To commemorate the special event, on Saturday, April 15, 2023, fraternity members, both Secular and Religious Franciscans, and family members gathered to celebrate the 100th anniversary of St Francis Of Assisi Fraternity in Escanaba.

The Saturday, April 15th gathering first began with Mass at St. Joseph church, celebrated by Fr. Tim Furgason, and a homily by Br. Jerome Schroder, OFM Cap, La Verna Regional Spiritual Assistant. After Mass everyone enjoyed a delicious lunch with lots of conversation.

Jeanne Thill, OFS, St. Francis of Assisi fraternity member, presented a well-rounded history of the fraternity with important historical dates and events. Also, Lee Ann Niebuhr, OFS La Verna Regional Spiritual Assistant gave the group a splendid talk on 'what it means to belong to a fraternity.'

Reflections

by Fr. Lester Bach OFM Cap, (October 15, 1931 - February 2, 2020)

Fr. Lester was invested in the Capuchin habit in 1949, professed in 1953, and ordained in 1957. As La Verna Regional Spiritual Assistant for many years, Fr. Bach also contributed his writings meant as reflection to support Secular Franciscans on their spiritual journey. Here is one reflection Lester wrote titled "Franciscan Family," which



was published in the Spring 2013 edition of the La Verna Vision newsletter. Enjoy.

"Much of our literature and many of our conversations talk about the "Franciscan Family." It is normal to do so. But most of us do not have the same parents. We grew up in a different family. While living with family, we picked up a lot of ways of doing things. We developed habits we thought were communication ideas. We learned how to show anger and how to push other people's "buttons," as we sometimes say. We learned ideas about religion. We recognized that there are people we refuse to deal with. Others were lazy or obsessed or strange or whatever. We learned a bit about money and what it can do and why it is important.

"Add all the things we learned in school. Sometimes we were mere copy-cats. We accepted values because someone we liked was "cool" or "awesome" or something else, depending on the "in" word. Others we neglected because it took too long to accomplish. We learned good as well as foolish things. But we rarely up-graded the rooms of our mind and heart.

"Then - we bring all this "stuff" to the Secular Franciscan Order. We learn quickly that we might have to discard a lot of our "things." Prejudice is no longer a virtue. Being a "pain in the neck" is no longer acceptable. Dominating conversations seemed a good thing until we learned that listening is also a good thing. Then we talked about stewardship and to be equally concerned about others who have less than we do.

"Now you belong to the Franciscan Family. They have a lot of values and ideas about God and life with people that haven't been part of life to this point. We are asked to initiate a process of "conversion." We are expected not only to talk about loving everyone, but doing it - even loving enemies! We discover that relationships are absolutely vital in Franciscan life - no matter what kind of folks we're talking about. Forgiveness and reconciliation are prime virtues in this Franciscan Family. Concern for one another and learning to share our internal thoughts, ideas, fears and dreams is no easy task.

"Question: How are you doing in being a part of the Franciscan Family? How is "conversion" doing in your life?"

Editor's note:

For most of his religious life, Fr. Lester Bach was involved in ministry to the Secular Franciscan Order, serving many years as La Verna Regional Spiritual Assistant. He was also involved in the formation ministry in the 1960s, as well as the preaching ministry beginning in the 1970s. His ministries took him to Huntington and Crown Point, IN, Saginaw, MI, Madison, Marathon, WI and Chicago. Fr. Lester Bach, OFM Cap celebrated 69 years of religious life.

During our last Zoom Formation Gathering on February 26, 2023 with La Verna Regional local formators, the REC Formation Team heard the challenges, hopes and dreams of the ten Fraternities Formators who were able to attend. Three local Fraternity Formators informed the team that they would be unable to join-in that evening. We missed hearing from four local Fraternities Formators and hope they will join us for the May 21, 2023 upcoming event.

Some of the challenges discussed at the February 26 meeting centered around low numbers in initial formation and recruitment efforts continue to be a concern. How to be prophetically creative in increasing these numbers takes the "whole fraternity" to address and continually explore options. Formation - Initial and On-going - has a lot of information to offer. How to convert this information into formation is the process of change, conversion and communion; that is, working with reflection and contemplation.

Lectio Divia says it so succinctly: read it, respond to it, reflect on it and sit with it in contemplation. This is easy to say intellectually and perplexing to get it from the head to the heart. I have been learning more and more about the process of contemplation this last year. As our Rule says "...so let prayer and contemplation be the soul of all they are and do."

We are marvelously, wonderfully made for contemplation. Do you believe? The fruit of contemplation is TRANSFORMATION. As I have seen some of the fruits of the Holy Spirit being more real in my attitudes and lived experience. As formators, how do we "teach" the process of spiritual growth? How do we pray and contemplate with those in initial formation and on-going formation?


National News -

The Franciscan Centenary By Bret Thoman, OFS

In the same way we celebrate birthdays or wedding or profession anniversaries, our order commemorates significant events in the life of Francis. These are moments to reflect. We take time to consider what these events mean to us, how they shaped or formed us, and how they affect our identity. We look back at what happened in time in order to consider where we are now, and where we wish to go from here.

Unlike our own life events, in which we recall such events in years, the order marks events in the life of St. Francis in terms of centuries. These are centenaries. Anyone who has been on pilgrimage to Assisi may have noticed past centenaries. For example, in the cemetery chapel of Bastiola, not far from Assisi, there is a plaque dated 1912. It was placed there to commemorate the seventh centenary of St. Clare's arrival; at the then monastery of San Paolo after leaving her family on Palm Sunday, 1212.

More recently, over the past two decades, there have been a number of eighth-centenary events. In 2006, there was the "spoliation" of Francis; that is, when he stripped before his father and the bishop (1206). In 2009, there was the oral approval of the rule by Pope Innocent X and the creation of the order (1209). In 2012, there was Clare's conversion (1212). In 2017, there was the chapter of mats (1217), while in 2021,



we recalled the letter written by Francis that marks the beginning of the Third Order (1221).

But these were all minor commemorations compared to the centenary events that will take place over the next few years. From 1223 through 1226, a series of major milestones in the life of St. Francis will be celebrated. This year, 2023, we commemorate the eighth centenary of the approval of the Later Rule of St. Francis and the Christmas at Greccio (1223). Next year, in 2024, we will recall the Reception of the Stigmata on Mt. La Verna (1224). Then in 2025, we will commemorate the composition of the Canticle of the Creatures (1225). Finally, what is being referred to as the Easter of Francis – that is, his death and passing to eternal life (1226/2026) will be celebrated. These events will coincide with the Jubilee in the Catholic Church in 2025

La Verna Regional Treasurer's Report by Bob Henning, OFS

Three interesting things I have heard while at different meetings are questions regarding finances, lapsing, and member status. Although we as Secular Franciscans are supposed to lead a life of detachment from worldly goods - OFS Rule article #11 - that does not mean our fraternities are intended to maintain a minimal amount of funds.

FINANCES

Fraternities are expected to do good works - Rule articles #1, #7 and #14, help those in need - Rule article #15, - and adopt various apostolates, - articles #15, #16, #17 and #18, while supporting the

next high level of Franciscans - article #25, and the other various and sometimes unexpected costs. All of these things mean fraternities must establish and maintain an amount of money that was established by their council as their individual budget.

This brings the need for a yearly budget - OFS General Constitution #50.2.e and NS #5.5.i and NS #6.4.c - that the council determines based upon all expected expenses. The amount is then divided by the number of members and that would be each one's fair share. Because we live in uncertain times regarding inflation, fraternities should accumulate a general fund amount that is about 1½ times the budget which is what the OFS-USA recommends.

ABOUT LAPSING

This is only a temporary provision – OFS Rule article #23, OFS General Constitution #50.2.c, 56.1. 56.3 and 57, NS #18.7.b and 20, and can be reversed once the original impediment has been overcome. Lapsed members are STILL Franciscans! It is the duty of the council to dialogue with those members about the issues preventing the member from fully participating in fraternity to help, but if the condition cannot be resolved, the request to be lapsed should be approved. Lapsed members are not counted as a fraternity member, they are not active.

MEMBER STATUS

The word active has evolved to 'fully active' and 'active excused.' Both are considered to be Active and are counted as part of the fraternity number.

BEQUESTS

We must thank and pray for our sister Elizabeth (Betty) Sullivan, OFS, who met Sister death on September 21, 2022. Betty had the Rite of Admission on June 12, 1993. She took her 1st temporary Profession on April 20, 1995, and her Permanent Profession on May 17, 1997. Betty was part of the St. Paschal Baylon Fraternity and then the emerging Sts. Francis and Clare Fraternity in Madison. Betty bequeathed \$10,000 to our Region.

The Franciscan Tau Symbol

The Franciscan symbol of the "crossed arms" depicts the arms of Jesus and Francis crossed over the Tau, both bearing the imprint of the Crucifixion nails. Francis' arm is enclosed in the sleeve of his habit. It is a celebration of that remarkable gift of grace which St. Francis received on Mt. Alverna, September 17th - the Stigmata ... the bearing in his own body of the marks of his crucified Lord.

Just before he died on October 3rd, Francis stretched out his arms over his brothers in the form of a CROSS and blessed them in the power, and in the name of their crucified Lord. Then he told them, "I have done what was mine to do; may Christ teach you what is yours."

So we consider this symbol of our Franciscan life a true expression of the life of St. Francis, as well as a reminder to us of our own Christian call and sincerity of response.

THE TAU AS OUR FRANCISCAN SYMBOL

Where did the Tau come from and what does it mean? The Tau represents the Cross. It is also the last letter of the Hebrew alphabet. However, the two major influences on Francis concerning the Tau were the Antonians and the Fourth Lateran Council.

St. Francis borrowed the Tau and what it meant to him from the Antonians. They were a religious community of men founded in 1095 whose sole function was to care for lepers. They were disbanded as an Order by the Church in the 1500's because leprosy was no longer a problem, and many of the religious orders had fallen into theological problems. On their habit was painted a great Tau cross. Francis was very familiar with these men because they staffed the leper house in Assisi and the hospital in Rome where Francis went to stay. This is now the church of San Francisco A Ripa. Everytime you see St. Anthony, "the Abbot or Hermit" in art, he is portrayed with the Tau.

St. Francis was exposed to the Tau through the direct influence of the Antonians, but the greatest influence of all that made the Tau so dear to Francis, whereby it became his signature, was the Fourth Lateran Council.

Pope Innocent III opened the Council on November 11, 1215, with these words: "I have desired with great desire to eat this Passover with you." (Luke 22:15) Innocent announced that for him, for the Church, and for every Catholic at the time, the symbol they were to take as the sign of their Passover was the Tau Cross.

Pope Innocent incorporated into his homily the statement from Ezekiel (9:4) that the elect, the chosen, those who are concerned will be marked with the sign of the Tau. He explained that this Passover is a three-fold Passover. Every Catholic must be involved in the triple Passover: A Corporal Passover, a Spiritual Passover, and an Eternal Passover.

These became some of the most precious themes of Francis' preaching. He must have taken them so deeply to heart that when Pope Innocent III ended his homily with "Be champions of the Tau." Francis evidently took that as a personal statement and made the Tau his own symbol: a symbol for his Order, his signature, painted it everywhere, and had great devotion to it for the rest of his life.
